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



ECONOMIC LIVABILITY

Summit County is home to:
30,000 year-round residents or 11,750 HH

Average FIRC household size:
3 people

Summit County households of 3 need to earn:
\$103,255

Average income for a FIRC household:
\$46,200

The Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for a family of 3:
\$25,820

Summit County has the second-highest cost of living in Colorado
(runner-up to Pitkin County)

Summit County
families need to earn
3 to 4 times
the federal poverty level
to be self-sufficient



A.L.I.C.E.

Alice: Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed

“Earning more than the Federal Poverty Level,
but not enough to afford the basics where they live.”

Labor Force Participation Rate: 76% (state avg: 69%)

- ALICE Households: 32% (state avg 28%)
- Households in Poverty: 6% (state avg 9%)



per week



Designated Grant Income: **\$716,500**


